

Dear Legislative Leaders and fellow Minnesotans,

The Minnesota Legacy Amendment's Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund helps to enrich the lives of all Minnesotans and strengthens the vibrant culture that makes our state such a great place for our diverse residents to live, work and play. Through our innovative public service and programming, **Minnesota Public Radio ("MPR") delivers the Legacy Amendment's mandate "to support arts, arts education and arts access, and to preserve Minnesota's history and cultural heritage."**



Reaching more than one million listeners each week, MPR and its three regional services—MPR News, Classical MPR and The Current[®]—produce programming for radio, digital and live audiences. Forty-five MPR stations provide our statewide reach. Through this robust broadcast network, **MPR exudes the principle of the Legacy Amendment's public broadcasting priority to expand Minnesotans' "knowledge, information, and access to arts, and Minnesota's history and cultural heritage."** This Legacy Amendment principle is tied directly to MPR's mission "to enrich the mind and nourish the spirit, thereby enhancing the lives and expanding the perspectives of our audiences, and assisting them in strengthening their communities."

MPR's exemplary Minnesota arts programming is possible, in large part, by support from Legacy funds which are dedicated by Minnesotans and approved by Legislators to preserve and promote the state's arts and cultural heritage. We feature talented Minnesota artists of many disciplines across all three of MPR's regional services. MPR weaves our arts, culture and history into the fabric of daily Minnesota life, and works to ensure that the arts continue to thrive. In addition to broadcast and digital services, MPR's in-person events and services offer a unique educational experience that provides students direct exposure to professional performing arts and artists.

Highlights of MPR's activities in the 2017 fiscal year include:

- Classical MPR's signature education program Class Notes Artists received rave reviews from students and educators alike. During the 2017 school year, Class Notes Artists engaged more than 18,500 students statewide. This year's Artists traveled across Minnesota to schools in Bemidji, East Grand Forks, Proctor, and Winona, among others, and visited selected schools in the metropolitan area.
- MPR News covered arts events of both national and local significance. Euan Kerr covered the national conversation generated by the Scaffold sculpture initially planned for the Walker Art Center's renovated sculpture garden. Marianne Combs' Art Hounds highlighted Minnesota Artists from communities including Brainerd, Fergus Falls, Hutchinson, Lake Benton, Madison, Silver Creek, and Willmar.
- The Current took its show on the road to Duluth and Winona to support Minnesota music and local musicians. In Duluth, we hosted six free events in the days leading up to the All Pints North festival, which draws 3,500 attendees annually. In Winona, The Current hosted a free concert at the Marine Art Museum to kick off Mid West Music Fest, which had more than 1,800 attendees this year.

MPR marked its first half century as an essential public service for Minnesotans on January 22, 2017. Throughout the year, we'll engage citizens and communities across the state and across all three of our services—on air, online, and in person—to show our appreciation for what we've achieved together. We'll share highlights from our 50-year archive of local arts and culture coverage, made possible in part by Minnesota's Legacy Amendment Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund. We appreciate your continued support and look forward to our next 50 years as MPR expands our commitment to inform, inspire, entertain, and energize audiences across Minnesota.


Minnesota is a culturally rich and diverse state. MPR's programs are aligned with the goals of the Minnesota Legacy Amendment's Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund to create and showcase "arts, history and cultural heritage programs that will bolster Minnesota's reputation as a center for creativity, innovation and imagination, supporting the long-term vitality of our state." MPR achieves the state of Minnesota's goals through MPR News, Classical MPR, The Current, and live events programming.

In 2008, Minnesota's voters passed the Clean Water, Land, and Legacy Amendment (Legacy Amendment) to the Minnesota Constitution. The amendment created four funds, one of which is the Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund ("ACHF"). The ACHF receives 19.75 percent of the sales tax revenue resulting from the Legacy amendment to support arts, arts education and arts access, and to preserve Minnesota's history and cultural heritage.

Minnesota Public Radio is a proud that the Minnesota Legislature has chosen to allocate ACHF funds for our work across Minnesota. Following each fiscal year, MPR is required to submit an annual report to the Legislature detailing its ACHF activities and expenditures. This report covers MPR's programs and projects conducted in our 2017 fiscal year and supported by the following ACHF Grant:

- MPR Fiscal Year 2017 (July 1, 2016 June 30, 2017) \$1,520,960 total award

Minnesota Public Radio operates a 46-station radio network serving nearly all of Minnesota and parts of surrounding states. Reaching more than 1 million listeners each week, MPR and its three regional services—<u>MPR</u> <u>News</u>, <u>Classical MPR</u> and <u>The Current</u> —produce programming for radio, digital and live audiences. MPR marks 50 years of public service in 2017 with a full year of new conversations, taking place new programming and special events on air, online and in person at locations throughout the state. MPR News has long been recognized as one of the foremost journalistic organizations in the Upper Midwest, available to news consumers on multiple platforms (broadcast, online, mobile, On Demand, etc.). Reaching more than 500,000 listeners each week, the MPR News radio signal can be heard by 95 percent of Minnesotans, and is the only news station with bureaus located throughout the state. MPR News partners with one of the largest TV stations in the region, KARE 11, and with more than 30 newspapers in Minnesota. MPR News has received numerous awards for its reporting and, in 2017, received a George Foster Peabody Award, Alfred I. DuPont Award and RTDNA Edward R. Murrow Award for its investigative reporting. 

Legacy Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund Activities Minnesota Public Radio 50th Anniversary – MPR50

On January 22, 1967, Minnesota Public Radio went live for the first time with a broadcast of the Cleveland Orchestra. Ever since, MPR has informed, inspired, entertained and energized Minnesotans. Throughout 2017, we are sharing highlights from MPR's 50-year archive of local, regional and national arts and culture coverage as well as engaging Minnesotans in arts activities across the state. MPR is proud to share these highlights that align with the goals of the Minnesota Legacy Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund.

MPR News: Faces of Minnesota Photo Exhibit and Digital Montage

In celebration of MPR's 50th Anniversary, MPR News created a photo exhibit with an accompanying digital montage to highlight peoples' activities who make Minnesota unique. The exhibit and montage feature images of Minnesota arts and cultural activities as captured by Minnesota-based photographers. Our "Digital First" strategy is an important component of MPR's focus to connect with new audiences in unexpected and resonant ways that includes not just exceptional content but images. **MPR depends upon Minnesota photographers to capture representative, artistic images to pair online with stories by our journalists**.

Faces of Minnesota displays the work of twenty-five photographers, each of whom was based in Minnesota at the time they worked with MPR. We have one photographer on staff and regularly hire freelancers. In keeping with MPR's commitment to employing artists statewide, **the exhibit includes work by photographers from a range of Minnesota communities, including Bemidji, Duluth, Mankato, Moorhead, and Rochester**. When the exhibit has completed its tour, MPR News will create an online gallery of approximately 100 photos from both the exhibit and the montage.



Classical MPR: Bring the Sing

On April 26, 2017, *Bring the Sing* brought its community choir magic to the birthplace of Classical MPR, Saint John's University in Collegeville, as part of a two-day 50th Anniversary celebration. *Bring the Sing* had a festive atmosphere as it brought together Minnesotans to celebrate the state's choral tradition with a performance in the magnificent Saint John's Abbey. All voices were included and the ability to read music was not required. Singers who registered in advance received sheet music prior to the event and walk-ins were enthusiastically welcomed. The evening kicked off with a light buffet, allowing participants to get to know their neighbors before raising their voices together in song. Minnesota-based Somali-indie-pop band *Ambassadors of Culture* performed during dinner.

G. Phillip Shoultz, III, Associate Conductor and Education Program Director for *VocalEssence*, conducted the joyful mass choir, which drew nearly 400 singers from central Minnesota and from around the state. Choirs from Saint John's University and the College of Saint Benedict, led by Axel Theimer, and the St. John's Boys' Choir, led by Andre Heywood, participated. Central Minnesota's Amadeus Chamber Symphony, also led by Axel Theimer, added to the majesty of the performance. *Bring the Sing* will be broadcast on Classical MPR's *Choral Stream*, which relies, in part, on Legacy funding.

In April, Bring the Sing brought its community-choir magic to the birthplace of Classical MPR, Saint John's University in Collegeville, Minn., capping a two-day celebration there of MPR's 50th anniversary and its long association with St. John's and its sister institution, the College of St. Benedict.

G. Phillip Shoultz, III led choirs from both colleges as well as nearly 400 singers drawn from central Minnesota and from around the state. The event, which took place in the architecturally famed St. John's Abbey, also capped this year's Bring the Sing season; earlier gatherings took place in <u>Rochester</u> and in <u>Duluth</u>.

Minnesotans are discovering the joy and community of singing together in large numbers through Bring the Sing and will be able to do so throughout the coming year, too. On August 13, as part of a weekend-long celebration of the newly restored State Capitol, Bring the Sing teams up with VocalEssence for a come-one-come-all community sing that will include familiar folksongs, hymns and other pieces. Special guests will be announced.

PRINCE: Commemorating the First Anniversary of His Death

The first anniversary of Prince's death saw local, national, and international media focus on MPR's rock station, The Current, and other Minnesota landmarks like First Avenue and Paisley Park. The Current featured on-air coverage, special digital segments and live events to give the widest array of fans access to Prince's legacy.


• On Friday, April 21, 2017, the anniversary of Prince's death, The Current played the music of Prince for 24 hours. Hour-long playlists curated by The Current hosts and special guests like local musicians were interspersed among the programming. Playlists featured Prince's best guitar solos, chart hits, B-sides, family tree, and more. Of special note was an exclusive *Theft of the Dial* session hosted by Andrea Swensson which was curated by Prince's band The Revolution. The station also aired live on-air check-ins from Paisley Park, where The Current's Andrea Swensson, Jim McGuinn, Brian Oake, Jill Riley, and Mark Wheat, along with MPR News' Tom Weber, took part in panels and commemorations.



- **On Saturday, April 22**, The Current counted down the Top 89 Prince songs as selected by fans using an online voting system. As the countdown wound down, The Current began live reporting from the Prince Memorial Street Party at First Avenue which is the club where Prince got his start and was featured prominently in his film *Purple Rain*. The party then moved inside for a dance party until 4:00 a.m.
- On Sunday, April 23, The Current partnered with First Avenue to host *I Would Dance 4 U: A Kids Dance Party* for all-ages featuring the music of Prince.

The Prince Memorial Street Party in front of First Avenue was made possible in part by the Minnesota Legacy Amendment's Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund, **allowing The Current to hire seventeen Minnesota solo artists and bands and to provide free tickets to a capacity crowd of 2,500 attendees**. A special element of this year's Prince coverage was the inclusion of Hanna Bubser who is part of **The Current's College Contributors** program. Hanna was a sophomore at Hamline University, studying English with a focus on writing and Digital Media Arts with a focus on audio mixing.

In Hanna's own words: "I really enjoy working with radio, so my time with the College Contributors program has greatly influenced that. My favorite experience with College Contributors thus far was when I visited Paisley Park earlier this year. What an incredible experience! I learned so much about Prince and his legacy. I feel like I know all about Prince now because I have worked on tons of projects about him during my time here. I think that's wonderful."

Excerpts from a note by Andrea Swensson, host of *The Local Show*, to her colleagues at MPR following the first anniversary commemorations of Prince's death:

From the first moment I stepped on stage at Paisley Park to lead my first panel discussion, it was immediately clear that people not only knew what The Current was but that they <u>loved</u> us. Keep in mind that only about 10 percent of the attendees at Celebration (note: event series hosted at and by Paisley Park) were from the Twin Cities – still, every time I said, "I'm from 89.3 The Current," people would start clapping, whooping and hollering, screaming at me, "We love the Current!" "We listen from Chicago!" "We listen from Australia!" "We listen from Germany!"

I know we talk a lot around here about "impact" and "reach" [in] our community of listeners, and sometimes I feel disconnected from these sentiments because we're just here at work in our cubes, focusing on the day to day. But man, this weekend was an incredible reminder not just of how wide our network of listeners stretches, but how significant our work around Prince has been to the people who loved his music the most. Many of the people I met had tears in their eyes as they thanked me, and a few were even able to express that they felt we were intricately woven into their grieving process and helped them to come to terms with this loss. I have no words to add to that – just wow. What an honor and responsibility.

By the end of this weekend it was so clear that we have now become part of the lexicon of what people talk about when they talk about Prince and Minneapolis.

I thought you'd like to know. Thank you. I'm so proud to be here with you.

Highlighting Minnesota Artists

MPR News: Art Hounds

Art Hounds is a weekly feature produced by MPR News arts reporter Marianne Combs. Each *Art Hounds* installment features three members of the Minnesota arts community who each share an upcoming performance, opening, or event. To build and strengthen relationships among our local artisans, *Art Hounds* commentators cannot self-promote but instead talk about the work of others.

Ideas are suggested via MPR's Public Insight Network online portal, reviewed by Ms. Combs, and each week's show is produced based on the slate of upcoming events. Diversity across art forms, *Art Hounds* voices, and geographic location are all considered when producing each week's show. *Art Hounds* features at least one activity in Greater Minnesota each week, comprising 33% of the total content produced annually.

During fiscal year 2017, *Art Hounds* included 136 different community-nominated events in its programming. Arts events in the seven-county metropolitan area took place in Minneapolis, Osseo, Plymouth, and St. Paul. The Arrowhead and Southeastern regions were well-represented during *Art Hounds*, represented respectively by the thriving arts communities of Duluth and Lanesboro, Northfield, and Red Wing.

MPR News: Minnesota Arts Coverage

MPR News reports on Minnesota arts as part of its regular programming, weaving it into daily coverage as stories of both local and national significance emerge. Marianne Combs and Euan Kerr are MPR News' lead arts reporters with each employing their own strategies and perspectives to ensure coverage is comprehensive, thoughtful, and geographically representative of arts across the state. Marianne Combs has been with MPR for more than twenty years, with fifteen years dedicated to forging relationships and covering the local arts and culture scene. Mr. Kerr is a native of Scotland who came to MPR in 1985 and, in addition to serving as a reporter, editor, and producer for the organization, also served as part of BBC News and BBC Radio Scotland in the 1990s.

Marianne Combs focused on bringing diverse voices to the forefront during her coverage of the Minnesota arts and culture scene in fiscal year 2017. Her approach was sensitive to the inclusion of artists regardless of race, ethnicity, gender, sexual identity, or ability. The result was a robust representation of Minnesota's artists, their talents and the impacts generated by their works.



David Stewart and the Guthrie Theater: David Stewart is a rarity in theater, a mixed-race member of the production team. As the new Director of Production for the Guthrie, he is working to advance the conversation about the need for diversity of staff at all levels of the theater, not just on stage. Marianne Combs produced this story in July 2016 and it had a very personal impact on a listener: "A father contacted me saying that his black daughter [Olivia] was very interested in costume design – did he think David would be willing to talk to her? I connected them, and they set up a day for her to tour the Guthrie, including a visit to the costume shop."


Kevin Kling and Interact Center's Theater Company: Beloved Minnesota storyteller and performer Kevin Kling has worked with Interact since a motorcycle accident left him with a brain injury several years ago. Interact is comprised of artists with physical and cognitive disabilities, and this year Kling co-wrote a show specifically for the company. *What Fools These Mortals Be* weaves together Shakespeare's works and Kling's signature humor to create a piece that is challenging in part due to the large amount of text, which is atypical of an Interact show. Matt Dahlstrom, a company member with Down syndrome, brought the character of Hamlet to life during the show's run in December 2016.


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'What Fools' looks at Shakespeare from a new

Interact Center's theater company, made up of artists with physical and cognitive disabilities, has always embraced challenges. "What Fools These Mortals Be," a celebration of the works of William Shakespeare, may be its most ambitious production yet.



Vietnam. His work reflects his life, beginning as a young immigrant in Minneapolis' Phillips neighborhood and continuing through his co-parenting of a now, seven-year old. The force of his poetry comes from his voice as a person who has been marginalized, using his creativity to tell the forgotten and or underrepresented story of his community. In addition to being a nationally-recognized poet, Bao Phi is a Program Director at the Loft Literary Center, where he has fostered a vibrant and diverse spoken word and poetry scene. His most recent book *Thousand Star Hotel* was released in May 2017.

During MPR's fiscal year 2017, **Euan Kerr covered stories which had national resonance in addition to local significance**. His reporting of these stories involved both delving into MPR's archives to provide context for current arts events as well as producing successive follow-up stories over the course of several weeks. Highlights from his sixty-plus stories over the year:

Theater and Film

Mr. Kerr has undertaken an ongoing examination of how local theater and film arts have been addressing issues facing underserved communities.

August Wilson and Lou Bellamy: One of Mr. Kerr's stories focused on Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright August Wilson, who lived in St. Paul for many years, and his friendship and collaborative relationship with the Founder of St. Paul's Penumbra Theatre, Lou Bellamy. Mr. Wilson wrote the play *Fences* while living in St. Paul and Penumbra has previously produced the work. The film adaptation of *Fences* featuring Denzel Washington and Viola Davis opened nationwide in 2016, garnering critical praise and an Academy Award for Ms. Davis. Mr. Kerr and Mr. Bellamy saw a special screening and had a conversation about August Wilson's work and life in St. Paul. This story included links to MPR Archive material featuring coverage of Mr. Wilson over the years.

Underserved Communities and Local Theater: The year

included ongoing examination of how members of the local theater community are addressing issues facing underserved communities. Highlights covered were: Wonderlust Theater's "crowd-sourced" production about the myriad issues surrounding adoption; Mixed Blood's site-specific play at the Saints Stadium about the racial and immigration issues in baseball; and a profile of Prime Productions, a new theater company telling the stories

of, and featuring performers, who are women over 50 years old.

Sundance Film Festival: A short Minnesota film was chosen from thousands of entries to be shown at the Sundance Film Festival. The eight-minute film is the story of a black mother's quest to keep her sons safe by marching them door to door to introduce them to their white neighbors. Actor Sha Cage and her husband E.G. Bailey were the driving forces behind the film.

Fridlund. Ms. Barnhill's *The Girl Who Drank the Moon* won a Newbery Award. Ms. Fridlund's *History of Wolves* achieved the distinction of being short-listed for the Man Booker Prize, which recognizes outstanding fiction and is a remarkable accolade for a first-time writer.

Dance

James Sewell Ballet and Fred Wiseman:

Nationally renowned Minneapolis-based James Sewell Ballet premiered a work based on the film Titicut Follies. Created in collaboration with the film's director Fred Wiseman, the ballet garnered national attention. The source material created great controversy when filmmaker Wiseman first attempted its release in 1967. He created a documentary capturing the inhumane conditions at a Massachusetts mental hospital, setting off a chain of events that prevented the film's initial release. In 2014, Mr. Wiseman received a grant to translate one of his films into a dance piece. He seized the opportunity to revisit Titicut Follies and selected Minneapolis-based James Sewell Ballet as collaborator for the work which premiered in March 2017. Mr. Kerr followed the progress of the *Titicut Follies* collaboration for a series of pieces over three years, which is an unusually longterm commitment to a single story.

Minnesota and Dance: Mr. Kerr also covered *Merce Cunningham: Common Time*, the huge exhibit about the dance legend at the Walker Art Center; the creation and premier of *Soft Goods*, a production by Karen Sherman about suicide and depression amongst stage hands; and a collaboration between a neighboring ballet company and boxing gym, which has changed how both go about their daily routines, garnered respect for each other's art forms, and provided inspiration for new work.

Visual Art

Scaffold and the Walker Art Center: The controversy around Sam Durant's installation *Scaffold* at the revitalized Walker Art Center Sculpture Garden erupted just before Memorial Day weekend in 2017. The story quickly received national attention as local Native Americans and their allies objected to the gallows sculpture being installed on previously Native-owned land. Not only was MPR News reporting from the site almost daily, Euan Kerr had a conversation with artist Sam Durant and Walker Art Center director Olga Viso to reflect on the experience following its resolution.

Future unknown, Ojibwe writer Jim Northrup recalls life well-lived



Native Artists: Mr. Kerr covered local Native artists throughout fiscal year 2017, with *Scaffold* being an unexpected feature. Among the most meaningful was his conversation with Ojibwe writer Jim Northrup which took place just months before he died, with Mr. Northrup looking back on his life. Additionally, Mr. Kerr spoke with novelist Gerald Vizenor about his novel *Treaty Shirts* and produced a profile of the artist Frank Big Bear, who was working with native youth as he prepared to install his massive new collage at the Walker Art Center.

Classical MPR: Regional Recordings

Classical MPR's regional recordings team travels to venues throughout the state to record live ensembles in the seven-county metropolitan area and Greater Minnesota. The regional recordings team is responsible for more than day-of-performance recordings and is occasionally called to produce live broadcasts and attend rehearsals to prepare for recordings. **During fiscal year 2017, the team supported 159 regional recordings activities.**

The seven-county metropolitan area recordings are largely of the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, the Minnesota Orchestra, the Minnesota Opera, and the Schubert Club's Music in the Park Series. Regional recordings provide opportunities for ensemble to be heard on Classical MPR and enhance their ability to serve as cultural ambassadors when touring outside of Minnesota. Ensembles may request that MPR provide recordings to radio stations in the cities of national or international tour stops to increase local audience interest.

Greater Minnesota regional recordings comprise performances by the Duluth Symphony Orchestra and the St. Olaf Choir Festival in Northfield, as well as performances by a variety of artists presented by Matinee Musicale (Duluth), Minnesota Beethoven Fest (Winona), and Chamber Music St. Cloud. A highlight is traveling to Winona to share live broadcasts from the Minnesota Beethoven Festival featuring worldrenowned performers like violinist Joshua Bell, the Boston Brass guintet, and Minnesota's own Dale Warland with the Festival Chorale. This is a signature Greater Minnesota event and Classical MPR enables audiences throughout Minnesota to hear the performances.

New to regional recordings in fiscal year 2017 was the inclusion of *Bring the Sing*, a Legacy-funded Classical MPR community choir event series, which was recorded for digital broadcast on Classical MPR's Choral Stream.

Classical MPR: Choral Stream

The Choral Stream is part of Classical MPR's Choral Works Initiative, which also includes regular coverage of the contemporary choral industry. For five years, the Choral Stream has provided audiences 24/7 access to choral music via the Internet and it is one of the only classical music streams dedicated solely to choral music. In celebration of the Choral Stream's fifth anniversary, Classical MPR featured choral highlights throughout each day during the month of April.

Capitalizing on Minnesota's rich tradition of choral singing, performance, and composition, **Classical MPR has committed to devoting 50% of the Choral Stream's content hours to Minnesota choral ensembles, conductors, and composers**. Choirs include professional and college ensembles as well as mixed voice, men's, women's, and youth choirs. Minnesota's National Lutheran Choir, Cantus, and the St. Olaf Choir are regularly heard alongside the Robert Shaw Festival Singers, Boston Camerata, and the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, among many others.


The Current: The Local Show®

Andrea Swensson explores Minnesota's local music scene, both past and present every Sunday night from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM and again on Local Current Mondays at noon on 89.3. Following the broadcast, The Local Show is available via the Internet on-demand at no charge to listeners. Ms. Swensson features the work of and interviews Minnesota artists each week, embracing a commitment to discovering the up-and-comers as much as finding past gems and giving them new airplay.

In December 2016, The Local Show found itself in the midst of a national story. Local songwriters Lydia Liza and Josiah Lemanski reimagined Baby It's Cold Outside and updated the lyrics to be more reflective of contemporary perspectives. The unexpected viral success included coverage by National Public Radio and CNN. As soon as Ms. Swensson realized that the cover was turning into a national story, the singer-songwriters were invited into the studio for an interview and performance.

The Current: Duluth Local Music

The Duluth Local Show, hosted by Mike Novitzki, can be heard live on The Current 90.9 in Duluth every Sunday at 8:00 PM. The show is available on The Local Current stream beginning at on Mondays at 2:00 PM and is available on-demand from any device. The Current 90.9 celebrated its first full year broadcasting on May 1, 2017. In addition to garnering broadcast listeners from the Duluth region, **the Duluth Local Show had more than 2,000 page views for those listening online**.

The Current: The Local Current Blog and College Contributors

The Local Current Blog is a packed with latest news, music, interviews, videos, and info about Minnesota's local music scene. In addition to being a go-to source for local music coverage, **The Local Current Blog provides an important opportunity for the College Contributors program** which is managed by Jay Gabler. Students work with The Current staff, partners at First Avenue and other organizations, and regularly have their writing featured on The Local Current Blog. The program has evolved over the years to provide the most robust experience possible for the college participants. Typically, students come from Minnesota and go to school to a Minnesota school, however occasionally Minnesotans attending college elsewhere also participate.

College Contributors finished fiscal year 2017 with a cohort of sixteen from eight Minnesota schools: Carleton College (Northfield), Hamline University, McNally Smith College of Music, Normandale Community College, St. Mary's University, Saint Paul College, University of Minnesota - Twin Cities, and University of St. Thomas.

College Contributors Profiles: Jackie Renzetti and Ibad Jafri



Jackie Renzetti recently graduated from the University of Minnesota with a degree in Political Science and Journalism. In addition to serving as a College Contributor for two years, Jackie worked at the Minnesota Daily and the U of M's college station Radio K. Her experience in media at the U of M positioned her well to be a College Contributor and in turn, Jackie's experience at The Current informed her scholastic work.

Jackie's work at The Current took on a higher profile in January 2016, when program manager Jay Gabler asked her to do some music history research for Andrea Swensson to embed in The Local Show. Because of the quality of Jackie's initial work, she came to "own" the History Spotlight and work closely to support Ms. Swensson. Jackie has found that having a woman role model (Ms. Swensson) in journalism is helpful and inspiring.

In her own words:

The experience has "given me the foundational skills I need and builds skills I can use as a journalist. For example, interviewing people for stories, getting feedback for how to be a better writer. I've also learned a bunch about Minnesota which has given me more contextual information on Minnesota arts and culture as I continue to work as a journalist."

Ibad Jafri was a senior at Carleton College when he served as a College Contributor. Ibad has graduated with a double-major in International Relations and Cinema and Media Studies.

In his own words:

"As a College Contributor I've been able to represent a respected institution in the Twin Cities and have a range of experiences uncommon for people my age. I'm particularly proud of an experience I had writing a piece on an event I covered in Red Wing. There, I was able to communicate with musicians of varying degrees of fame and experience while also

emphasizing the community aspect of the event I was covering. Doing that allowed me to provide a meaningful connection between The Current's work in the Twin Cities, my work at school in Northfield, and community initiatives elsewhere in greater Minnesota. Bridging those gaps has been a privilege."

And more recently:

"In related news, I now work for Senator Klobuchar in Minneapolis! I'm a caseworker, and also handle some duties on the press side. I had asked you to be a reference for this position when I originally applied several months ago, and I know that part of the reason they've entrusted me with press work is because of my prior experience at The Current, so I can't thank you enough for having taken me on."

Supporting Music Education

Class Notes Artists is part of Classical MPR's *Music for Learning* portfolio of programs, which are designed to foster students' passion for classical music. *Class Notes Artists* delivers programming in-person to elementary and middle school students across Minnesota. **Class Notes served more than 17,900 Minnesota students who attended 69 schools in 25 counties throughout** the 2016-2017 school year.

During 2016-2017, *Class Notes Artists* made a commitment to engage more students in Greater Minnesota. As a result, **60% of the schools were in Greater Minnesota and 40% were in the seven-county metropolitan area**. Our program goals also focus on reaching underserved populations. An average of 46% of participating students in the most recent school year benefit from the free and reduced lunch program and an average of 14% are English learners.

Class Notes Artists materials are available online at <u>http://www.classicalmpr.org/topic/</u>. These materials are available at no charge to anyone and meet Minnesota K-12 music education standards regardless of whether the



school participates in the current school year's Class Notes Artists program.

In addition to serving Minnesota students, *Class Notes Artists* provides employment opportunities for Minnesota artists to deliver the program in schools across the state. During the school year, **a total of 19 professional artists from seven performing groups were selected to provide** *Class Notes Artists* **programming. MPR has a rigorous process for selecting artists each year to determine the best fit for the program. While there are returning artists from time to time, diversity of instruments, musical styles, and classroom approach are sought each year.**

Class Notes Artists for the 2016-2017 were:



Gaelynn Lea is a classically-trained violinist and songwriter who has developed her unique style over the past twenty years. She won NPR's 2016 Tiny Desk Contest, garnering national attention. Gaelynn traveled to schools in the Bemidji area and to Bug-O-Nay-Ge-Shig School. Students at the school on the Leech Lake Indian Reservation performed a traditional dance for her in a serendipitous cultural exchange as Gaelynn played her Irish and folk-influenced fiddle compositions for the students.



The Cedarwood Duo (Hannah Peterson Green, flute and Joseph Trucano, piano) have been performing since 2013. Dancers Leah Gallas and Blake Nellis joined them this year as *Class Notes Artists*.



Dolce Wind Quintet was founded in 1995 and has been performing across Minnesota ever since. To engage students, they deliver program notes from the stage, talking about composers' backgrounds, the cultural context of the pieces, and musical elements for which the audience can listen.

Class Notes Artists consistently receives feedback that may be summed in one word: **MORE**. Even one visit each year, supported by the free online curriculum, has been reported by teachers to make an incredible impact. The program is typically at capacity with a waiting list of schools that wish to participate.



Mill City String Quartet performs throughout Minnesota. The quartet has participated in the *Class Notes Artists* before. During 2016-2017, MCSQ visited Washington Elementary in Owatonna, which had the highest percentage of both free and reduced lunch (98%) and English learners (69%) served for the school year.



The OK Factor is cellist Olivia Diercks (the "O") and violinist Karla Dietmeyer (the "K") who met in the music program at Luther College.



The Dream Songs Project is mezzo-soprano Alyssa Anderson and classical guitarist Joseph Spoelstra. TDSP visited eight schools, performing throughout the day at each one. **Sara Pajunen** is a

violinist, composer, and creator known as one of the "notable practitioners of Finnish folk music outside of Finland."



In addition to feedback from teachers, *Class Notes Artists* receives feedback from its most important community group: students. A student wrote the following note, misspellings included, and enclosed a drawing of Sara Pajunen with her violin.

Bring the Sing

Classical MPR's glorious community choral event series returned in fiscal year 2017. In addition to the MPR50 *Bring the Sing – Collegeville*, the program hosted its first event in Rochester and returned to Duluth. Part singalong and part choral workshop, hundreds of attendees gathered at each event to raise their voices together. The event included an extended refreshment break so that everyone had the chance to get to know their singing neighbors. **The event was free for participants and no previous singing experience was required.** For singers who wished to prepare prior to *Bring the Sing*, Classical MPR provided sheet music in advance.

Classical MPR has learned that *Bring the Sing* not only draws small groups of friends as participants, but also singers who attend alone who simply wish to enjoy the experience of choral singing. **Our registration lists have reflected participants driving several hours to be part of** *Bring the Sing*, demonstrating the special appeal of choral singing to Minnesotans statewide.

Bring the Sing – Rochester took place on January 14, 2017, at Lourdes High School's Fine Arts Auditorium under the direction of Conductor Joseph Osowski who is the Director of Choirs at St. Michael Albertville High School and Artistic Director of the East Central Minnesota Chorale.

The Current Goes to Duluth

The Current's presence at Mid West Music Fest has expanded year-

over-year, providing us the opportunity to share our talent and support local musicians. The 2017 Mid West Music Fest had more than 1,800 attendees from nine states and three countries (including the United States).

J.S. Ondara (*The Current Effect: Buzzing*) and Gaelynn Lea (*The Current Effect: Major Exposure*) both performed during the festival.

J.S. Ondara is relative newcomer to the Minnesota music scene and not well-known yet, particularly outside of the Twin Cities. The Current: A Candid Conversation on Race and Music

On June 15, 2017, The Current presented a conversation featuring Twin Cities scholars, media personalities, and musicians talking about race and music. Ka Vang, MPR's Director of Engagement, introduced **the panel of guests who took the stage at Urban Research and Outreach-Engagement Center (UROC) in North Minneapolis**. Ms. Vang also coordinated an outreach campaign to invite community members via Intermedia Arts, Juxtaposition Arts, Asian Media Access, Springboard for the Arts, Black Music America, National Association of Black Journalists, and Community Artists Leadership Initiative. In addition to the panel discussion, **the event included musical performances** by singer PaviElle and jazz drummer Eric Gravatt and his band *Source Code*. The conversation concluded with the panel fielding questions from the audience. This event was recorded and replayed on 89.3 The Current.

Panelists:

- Mahmoud El-Kati is a lecturer, writer, and commentator on the African American experience. He holds the title Professor Emeritus of History at Macalester College in St. Paul, Minnesota which has established the Mahmoud El-Kati Distinguished Lectureship in American Studies in recognition of his scholarly and community work. He participated as a panelist in MPR's *Human Potential* series in late 2016.
- Eric Gravatt is a jazz drummer currently living in Minneapolis. He has played with many of the greatest musicians and bands of jazz including Weather Report, Woody Shaw, Howard Roberts, Albert Ayler, Sonny Fortune, Kenny Dorham, Gary Batz, and more.
- Andre McNeal is an entrepreneur, music promoter and the CEO of Bachelor Boy Entertainment. He is also a social activist who operates Den Brothers and the Doorstep Foundation, nonprofits which provide mentoring for young African American men in Minneapolis.
- **PaviElle** is a vocalist, singer-songwriter, and spoken word artist. Her album *Fear Not* was released in January 2015 to high critical acclaim and she has been regularly featured on The Current.
- **Pete Rhodes** has been involved in broadcasting for over 30 years, including as the founder of the MN Black Music Awards and the cable channel BMA (aka Black Music America). He is currently President of the Urban Mass Media Group (UMMG) is a leading urban media service.
- Derrick Stevens is the Production Manager at The Current, where he has worked since the station's founding in 2005. A longtime radio veteran, he has worked at various stations, including KMOJ and at the former B96.
- Sarah White is a South Minneapolis-born musician who has independently released two solo albums, songs from which are played on The Current.

A Candid Conversation on Race and Music

Throughout the history of popular music, African American artists have faced challenges unknown to their white peers in the music industry. Even though many people in Minnesota may mean well, the state is no exception to this. This summer, The Current brought together some of the Twin Cities' well-known scholars, radio personalities and musicians to present a conversation centering on race and music in Minnesota.

The Current: Twin Cities 45th Annual Pride Parade

The Current regularly has a float and staff presence in the Twin Cities Pride Parade, which took place on June 25, 2017. Our float featured *Parade Karaoke* along the parade route through downtown Minneapolis. Legacy funds allowed The Current to hire numerous local performers including:

- Har Mar Superstar: singer-songwriter who grew up as Sean Tillmann in Owatonna and who tours nationally and internationally, performing locally as his schedule allows.
- Lisa Berman: hip hop/breakdancer and recipient of a 2016 McKnight Foundation Dancer Fellowship.
- **Cheng Xiong:** hip hop/breakdancer and member of Black Label Movement, In New Company, and Strong Movement.
- Wealthy Phonseya and Jurza Lee: members of hip hop collective House of Dance.

Minnesota Music at the Fitzgerald Theater ("Fitz")

Three concerts comprised Minnesota Music at the Fitz during fiscal year 2017. Each concert featured the premier of a new work by a Minnesota artist or ensemble. More than 2,600 attendees took in these shows.

- **Polica:** Hometown favorites Polica partnered with Berlin's s t a r g a z e to create *Music for The Long Emergency*. This unparalleled transatlantic partnership culminated with the work's premier a performance at The Fitz, marking the United States debut of s t a r g a z e. Legacy funding supported Polica's performance as part of this landmark event.
- Romantica with Jayanthi Kyle: After an extended hiatus, Romantica released their fourth and long-anticipated album, *Shadowlands*. The album was released on February 10, but MPR and The Fitz hosted an album pre-release party on February 4. Twin Cities-based artist Jayanthi Kyle was the opening act.
- Chastity Brown with Seaberg: Chastity Brown performed to a sold-out Fitz crowd as she celebrated her Red House Records debut, *Silhouette of Sirens*. "I'm so touched to see y'all here," Brown said during the encore, clearly inspired by the energy of the adoring audience. The band Seaberg was the opener.

Local Music for Films at the Fitz

In honor of MPR celebrating its 50th anniversary, *Films at the Fitz* featured a film from each of the past five decades. A local band performed prior to each screening. Legacy funding allowed MPR to hire five local bands to perform. *Films at the Fitz* has been noted as one of the City Pages best things to do for free. The fiscal year 2017 season distributed nearly 4,500 free tickets across five shows.

Preserving Minnesota History

MPR Archive

The Minnesota Cultural Leaders Collection was established to preserve Minnesota's cultural heritage by creating digital copies of historic news stories about Minnesota political, business, and cultural leaders. These newly digitized pieces are freely accessible to the public online and available to partners such as the Minnesota Historical Society and Minnesota Digital Library.

The initial goal was to digitize 2,200 stories in fiscal year 2017, but the archive team **exceeded that goal by completing 17,000 stories**. This success continued to capitalize on process efficiencies developed during fiscal year 2016. In addition to digitizing 17,000 stories, the archive team made significant process in publishing newly digitized stories to the online archive. **Digitized stories have been made available to the public and no charge via our online portal.** The MPR Newsroom also has depended up on the archive for access to features from the early 1970s to the late 1990s. These newly digitized features are easily accessible and inform contemporaneous reporting by providing investigative coverage and resources going back decades.
