## **Activity 1 - GREAT Theatre**

**Activity Type:** Workshop

**Description of program** – GREAT Theatre offered two workshops at each of GRRL’s 32 branches for children: an Explore & Connect Drama Workshop and a Page-to-Stage Workshop. Both workshops allowed children to explore drama from a variety of angles and inspire their imaginations. GREAT Theatre provided 10 Interactive Fairy Tale productions of “Rumpelstiltskin,” which were theatre productions with audience participation for ages 3-8. GREAT also developed a performance to go along with the 2011 Summer Reading Program, “One World, Many Stories,” which told stories from around the world and gave children a look at world cultures. This was performed at all 32 branch libraries in June.

### **Proposed Measurable Outcomes: End User**

Attendees or their parent/caregiver were able to identify one new concept or technique learned [workshops: knowledge] or have an increased positive attitude toward theatre [Interactive Fairy Tale: attitude].

**Measurable Outcomes:** Feedback was overwhelmingly positive and most feedback indicated that attendees learned acting about different theatre and acting concepts, and inspired children to be creative. One parent wrote that their daughter would like to be in a play after attending a Page-to-Stage workshop. “It’s great to have these options for our kids to learn about things they may otherwise not be introduced to,” wrote another. One comment was that a child enjoyed the acting games and felt more comfortable ‘acting’ in front of others after the workshop. One child wrote of the ‘Diary of a Wimpy Kid’ Explore & Connect workshop that he learned “how cool it is” to act.

## **Activity 2 – Genealogy Laptop Lab**

**Activity Type:** Education

**Description of program** – Using GRRL’s Laptop Lab, each branch will have up to one training session on searching for family history information. Sessions were presented by trained genealogists.

### **Proposed Measurable Outcomes: End User**

Attendees will be able to identify one new skill or resource learned [knowledge].

**Measurable Outcomes:** Feedback indicated that attendees learned about specific family history websites. One wrote that they found out the St. Michael Historical Society is a good place to get genealogy information via the class. One wrote, “I can’t wait to go home and use [what I learned].” Attendees also learned techniques for distinguishing good information from bad, and for formulating a meaningful search for genealogical information. Attendees frequently commented on how knowledgeable the presenters were (Stephen Barthel and Tom Rice). One comment was “Best presentation I’ve been to as far as getting information into time given—presenter didn’t get off subject.” Another wrote, “Grateful for presentation here locally.”

### **Activity 3 – Authors/Performers/Presenters**

**Activity Type:** Education

**Description of program** – Each GRRL branch had a pool of funds to plan author talks, artistic performances (music, dance, theatre, storytellers, etc.), or presentations related to arts and culture (genealogists, craftspeople, exhibits of artwork to support presentations by artists, etc.). Partners listed below under Activity Details.

#### **Proposed Measurable Outcomes: End User**

Attendees will be able to identify one new concept or fact learned about writing, history, art, etc. [knowledge] or have an increased positive attitude about live music performance [concerts: attitude]

**Measurable Outcomes:** Attendees enjoyed a wide variety of performances and presentations. One attendee wrote, “I am so grateful for the opportunity to see Ann Reed LIVE! I can’t afford concert tickets and this was free!” Another wrote, “I enjoyed the speaker/poet and the personal touch she had with her poems and us [attendees].” Comments on the presentations from the Laura Ingalls Wilder presentation nearly all noted that they learned how difficult life was in the 1800s. Attendees of one of the Lauren Pelon events wrote that they learned about many different instrument and music types. Those who attended the CLIMB Theatre ‘Return to Honor’ performances wrote that they realized how difficult it is for soldiers returning home after fighting, and that there are ways they can help. All attendees of trips to the Guthrie Theater for performances were immensely positive. People appreciated not having to drive, going someplace they never would have gone without Legacy funding, and the high quality of the theatre available in Minnesota. One commenter wrote, “Surely appreciate what all Minnesotans can do when we work together. Putting all our pennies together we can build great works!”

### **Proposed Measurable Outcomes: End User**

**Measurable Outcomes:** In the final quarter of the year, most of the Pages of music events were concerts, which were appreciated. Attendees of the Pages of Music workshops learned more about Mozart’s life and music, including his life as a child musical prodigy. One attendee of the interactive dance performance wrote, “I saw different types of dance, and it was great to see the children join in—they learn so much this way!” A comment from someone who attended a mosaics workshop wrote, “[I learned] how to design, cut tile, use glue/grout. It was nice to do with my niece.” Another wrote, “I learned that working at mosaics is really great fun. I learned everything I needed to work at beginning mosaic art.
