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Project #1 Overview/Description


One Heartland's mission is to improve the lives of children, youth, and families facing significant health challenges or social isolation. We envision a world where everyone feels appreciated, celebrated, and free of stigma and discrimination. We want a community where individuals can learn and grow so that they may lead healthier and more productive lives. We meet these goals through our summer camp programs. We provide youth (ages 7-17) camps to three distinct marginalized groups: HIV/AIDS+ youth, LGBTQ+ youth, and LGBTQ+ families. Our programs provide a safe and accepting place for youth to enjoy summer camp activities while building community with peers and adults with similar identities. Aside from being fun, camp builds self-confidence, life skills, friendships, and memories.

Actual Measured Outcomes

Camp True Colors

Final Outcome: Successfully delivered 5 unique one- to two-week sessions of Camp True Colors, each attended by 39 Minnesota based LGBTQ+ youth aged 11-17, with two sessions specifically dedicated to transgender and gender-expansive youth. The Legacy grant facilitated financial aid, ensuring broad accessibility to campers.

Impact: Provided a safe and inclusive environment where LGBTQ+ youth could celebrate their identities and build essential life skills.

LGBTQ+ Family Camp

Final Outcome: Successfully ran a weekend LGBTQ+ family camp session, attended by 28 Minnesota based individuals, with active participation from families who identify with the queer community. The Legacy grant played a key role in providing financial aid, ensuring that families could fully engage in the camp experience.

Impact: Strengthened family bonds and provided a supportive environment for LGBTQ+ families to connect and share experiences.

Recruitment and Staff Diversity

Final Outcome: Effectively recruited and promoted One Heartland's programs, successfully hiring and retaining a diverse and inclusive staff that reflects the communities served.

Impact: Enhanced the delivery of culturally competent programming, fostering an environment of understanding and respect across all camp sessions.

Recreation Opportunities

Final Outcome: Offered a diverse range of outdoor recreational activities, ensuring that all campers had the opportunity to explore nature, learn new skills, and engage in physical activity.

Impact: Promoted physical health, environmental appreciation, and personal growth through active participation in various recreational activities.

Educational Activities

Final Outcome: Conducted impactful educational sessions on topics such as healthy relationships, leadership, self-advocacy, self-care, and coping skills, with all campers actively participating in at least one educational session relevant to their camp's focus.

Impact: Empowered campers with knowledge and skills essential for personal development and well-being, tailored to their unique needs and circumstances.

Community-Building Activities

Final Outcome: Developed and facilitated structured community-building activities, with campers participating in 3 small group activities daily and additional large group or camp-wide events. These activities fostered deep connections, support networks, and a strong sense of community.

Impact: Cultivated lasting friendships and support systems, with many campers maintaining connections and returning to camp year after year, contributing to a thriving, connected community beyond the camp experience.

Evaluation of Project

Goal: Provide a judgment-free, welcoming space where youth can fully express and celebrate their identity without fear of rejection.

Measurement: Campers are given surveys at the end of every camp session. One of the questions on the survey is, "Did camp provide a judgment-free, welcoming space where you can fully express and celebrate your identity without fear of rejection?" The response is on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being the highest mark.

Measurement: Camper and parent focus groups, we facilitate a group to discuss ways to improve our accessibility to all campers each year. Particularly focusing on providing a safe camp experience for youth with mental and physical health limitations.

Goal: Create opportunities for youth to gain life skills, build confidence, and access necessary resources so they can succeed in life.

Measurement: Campers are given pre- and post-surveys about their skills and interests. At the beginning of camp, youth are asked about what they want to learn, such as art, climbing, fishing, etc. and at the end of camp they are asked if they learned a new skill and if they have built confidence during their time at camp.

Goal: Facilitate connections and friendships between youth in similar circumstances, so they can develop a lifelong support network.

Measurement: Campers are given a survey at the end of camp that asks if they made friends at camp and if they will stay in contact with those friends. The survey also asks if they are a returning camper and if they have stayed in contact with friends from previous years.

Measurement: The number of campers who return year after year.

Goal: Provide educational opportunities around healthy relationships, mental health, LGBTQ+ issues, HIV/AIDS prevention and community resources.

Measurement: Campers are given surveys at the end of every camp session. One of the questions on the survey is, "Did camp provide educational opportunities around healthy relationships, mental health, LGBTQ+ issues, HIV/AIDS prevention and community resources." Campers are then asked to rank on a scale from 1-5 with 5 being the highest.

Goal: Campers will have an increased sense of belonging and connections by creating relationships with trusted adults.

Measurement: Campers are given a survey at the end of camp that asks if they made connections with trusted adults at camp and if they felt listened to and supported by adult staff. The survey also asks if they are older campers if they would be interested in returning as a leader in training and being placed on our Junior Counselor track, which is a pathway to becoming an adult counselor.

Measurement: Focus groups and meet ups that occur after camp to gain camper insight on how to make camp better. Our efforts focus on centering our campers experience to improve the quality of camp.

Measurement: The number of camp staff that reflect the target population of camp.

Measurement: Exit interviews with summer camp staff asking about their connection to campers and the overall camp experience.

Goal: Campers will have an increased sense of understanding and connection to nature and will develop a sense of care for and appreciation for the environment.

Measurement: Campers are given a survey at the end of camp that asks, "if camp helped provide an increased sense of understanding and connection to nature."


