Administration

Description of Program

Pioneerland Library System administration was responsible for overseeing legacy expenses and programs for FY 10 (July 1, 2009 –June 30, 2010) for its nine county region. During this fiscal year, legacy funds provided funding for 94 programs in the Pioneerland service area. Programs had a total attendance of 5,818.

During FY' 10, \$98,968.30 of Pioneerland's \$152,079.01 legacy funds was expended. All but \$100 of the nearly \$99,000 was spent in the second half of the fiscal year. This was due to time needed in the first half of the fiscal year to put into place internal structures and organizations needed to begin carrying out the project's many new programs as well as time needed to develop the programs.

Of the remaining \$53,000 of the legacy funds allocated to Pioneerland for FY'10 and carried over into the new fiscal year, approximately \$41,000 was spent in the months of July and August of 2010. The remaining FY'10 funds will be expended in either September of 2010 or the second quarter of FY 2011. Pioneerland is experiencing nearly a \$15,000 reduction in its FY'11 legacy allocation so the FY'10 carry over should help PLS retain the quality and number of programs in FY'11 that were successfully provided in FY' 10.

Activity <u>1</u> – Title: Statewide

Activity Type: Education, Subgrant, Workshop

Description of program

Pioneerland Library System (PLS) allocated 10% of its Legacy Funds to the statewide Strategic Legacy Initiative Partnership Fund. This statewide fund, overseen by the Council of Regional Public Library Directors, was used to coordinate and plan cooperative state-wide programs among the public library regions and its partner MHS. The programs and priorities were determined by a planning process of regional library directors, library managers and staff from the participating regions along with input from statewide partners. Planning leadership responsibility was under the direction of the MELSA Director. The fund was managed by the MELSA Director and SELCO Director (who served as the fiscal agent).

Event Dates and Locations:

7 Events were held in 5 libraries on 4 different days. See Appendix-State-wide for breakout on event locations (column 1) and dates (column 3).

Partner Organization(s):

Swift County Historical Society assisted with the Accidental Hero program on June 16th at the Appleton Library and Ortonville Library Friends assisted with David Kenny program on June 21st at the Ortonville Library. Other partners included librarians at the Appleton, Kerkhoven, Benson, Ortonville, and Graceville libraries.

Partner Organization(s) Contribution/Role in the Program:

The 5 PLS libraries promoted and hosted the 7 events. Ortonville Library Friends provided lunch.

Program Outputs: Outputs are things you can count such as attendance, number of new participants, and the number of attendees who had never been at a similar event, and so on.

Appendix-Statewide- identifies three statewide programs conducted in PLS during second half of FY 10. The programs were: 1) Accidental Hero 2) David Kenny and 3) Barrels: Root Beer Stands of Upper Midwest. These were all part of the State's Greatest Generation Program. These three programs were held a total of 7 times in 5 PLS libraries. A total of 150 people attended the programs. - 2) Unaware of root barrels and their role in American Life.
- 3) Learned about the effort that Minnesota contributed to the war.
- 4) Heighten awareness of the role(s) women at home played during WWII.
- 5) Greater appreciation of our liberties

Activity <u>2</u> – Title:Multi-regions "Connecting Minnesota Readers and Minnesota Writers"

Activity Type: Subgrant

Pioneerland's "Connecting Minnesota Readers and Minnesota Writers" was a joint project with the Plum Creek Regional Library (PCLS) who served as the fiscal agent for the two regions' legacy project. In addition to the following, one should also consult Plum Creek's Final FY' 10 Legacy report for additional information on this joint project.

Description of program: Pioneerland Library and Plum Creek cooperatively funded, planned, and carried out dozens of programs, events, and activities for the two regions, connecting Minnesotans in the two regions who are readers to Minnesotans around the state who are writers. The project resulted in sharing a wide range of information and personal connection with over 1,000 PLS readers and over a dozen Minnesota writers, bringing these two groups together for their mutual benefit and appreciation.

Event Dates and Locations:

During the second half of FY '10, events were held on 20 days at 28 different locations. Events weren't held during the first half of the year due to planning and the release date of legacy funds. See Appendix-Multi-Region for more details on event locations (Column 1) and dates (column 3).

Partner Organization(s):

See Appendix----Multi-Region for the list of 30 Pioneerland libraries who participated in this legacy project by providing space, promoting and hosting the events. Other partners were SAMMIE, PCLS and PLS's regional directors and administrative staff, and representatives from their boards or member libraries. Partner Organization(s) Contribution/Role in the Program:

A joint planning team was used to manage this project. Laurie Ortega, PLS Assistant Director, and Chris Lang, PCLS Legacy Funds Program Coordinator, lead a group which included member/branch library representatives from each system, SAMMIE, and other interested partners. Additionally, 30 Pioneerland branch libraries helped to promote programs and provided workshop space. Summary Outcomes:

- 2) In improving their knowledge of, and skills in, the art of writing, participants learned how to develop characters, plot lines and the workings of the publishing world.
- 3) In poetry sessions, participants learned techniques to revise and improve their poems with similes and metaphors.
- 4) In creating art, participants learned how to use their imagination and inspiration to create their own works of arts.
- 5) Participants learned new recipes and new styles of food preparation.
- 6) Other new skills and experiences were: 1) how to create book illustrations, 2) different styles of brewing beer and 3) an introduction to the Hmong culture

Activity 3 – Title: Region-wide "Read A Latte"

Activity Type: Education, Workshop

Description of program: Cindy Hendrickx, PLS's Appleton Librarian, worked with 15 librarians from 7 of PLS's 9 counties and 8 Minnesota authors in providing entertaining and informational instruction and programs. Participants were introduced to different genres and learned how to create fictional characters, draw illustrations and were exposed to the process of how books are written and published. They were instructed on how a story idea starts, develops and changes during the writing process and up till the work is completed.

Event Dates and Locations:

15 Events were held in 15 libraries on 10 different days. See Appendix-Region-wide for break-out on event locations (column 1) and dates (column 3).

Partner Organization(s):

In addition to the 15 library partners listed in column 1 of Appendix -Region-wide, other partners are cited in the 10 page document, "Pioneerland Library System: Legacy Regional Evaluations" Some of the partners identified are: Early Childhood Initiative (Ortonville), Friends of the Hector Library, Hutchinson Chamber of Commerce, KDUZ radio, Crow River Arts, and City of Maynard just to name a few.

Partner Organization(s) Contribution/Role in the Program:

Cindy Hendrickx lead a group of 15 PLS branch managers in coordinating events, securing authors, promoting programs and providing meeting space. Other partners are listed in the 10- page document, "Pioneerland Library System Legacy: Regional Evaluations."

Activity 4 – Title: Local: "Building Our Legacy Thru the Arts"

Activity Type: Education, Outreach, Subgrant, Workshop

Description of program: Legacy funds enabled PLS to sponsor local programs of authors, artists, and cultural events to audiences of all ages and demographics residing within the PLS region. In order to bring legacy events to the region, PLS's 32 libraries partnered with local arts, cultural, and historical organizations, and other related organizations or individuals.

Event Dates and Locations:

40 programs were held in 60 locations on 44 different days. See Appendix-Local for breakout on event locations (column 2) name of programs (column 3) and dates (column 4).

Partner Organization(s):

In addition to the 64 separate partners identified under column 1 of Appendix –Local, other information on partners are included in the 34- page document, "Pioneerland Library System Legacy: Local Evaluations" Some of the partners identified are: MACCRAY Elementary School, Girl Scouts, Early Childhood Initiative (Ortonville), Hector School, Peace Lutheran Church (Cosmos), Kerkhoven Senior Citizens Club, and Swift County Historical Society just to name a few.

- 4) Gained greater appreciation of poetry and learned more about different types of poetry as an example poetry that is set to music
- 5) Younger participants were taught about ethics related to stealing and the effects stealing has on others.
- 6) Young people were introduced to new tales of mythology
- 7) Many gained knowledge on how to become an author or illustrator and how to get their works published.

- 3. If participation by a regional public library system or a member local governmental unit is discontinued, ownership of the discontinuing system's or unit's assets purchased with Arts and Cultural Heritage funds, including cash or the fair market value thereof of such assets cannot be transferred by the applicant and shall revert to the Minnesota Department of Education for reassignment for library services elsewhere. (*Minnesota Rules* Chapter 3530.0200, Subp. 4(C).
- 4. The provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, (42 USC Sec. 2000d *et seq.*), its regulations and all other applicable federal and state laws, rules and regulations. (*Minnesota Rules* Chapter 3530.0200, Subp. 4(D).
- 5. That the regional public library system and its branches/members are in compliance with Minnesota Statutes 2004, Chapter 134.50 (a) so that all public library computers with access to the Internet available for use by children under the age of 17 must be equipped to restrict, including by use of available software filtering technology or other effective methods, all access by children to material that is reasonably believed to be obscene or child pornography or material harmful to minors under federal or state law, and section (c) so that the library prohibits, including through the use of available software filtering technology or other effective methods, adult access to material that under federal or state law is reasonably believed to be obscene or child pornography.
- 6. That the regional public library system and its branches/members are in compliance with *Minnesota Laws* 2000, Chapter 492, Article 1, Section 49, Subd. 5A, and has adopted a policy to prohibit library users from using the library's Internet access workstations to view, print, or distribute material that is obscene within the meaning of *Minnesota Statutes* 1998, Chapter 617, Article 241
- 7. An independent auditor's report of the systems' general purpose financial statements in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States shall include audit of the Arts and Cultural Heritage funds as a unique categorical fund account. The audit shall be submitted no later than 180 days after the close of the system's fiscal year. (*Minnesota Rules* Chapter 3530.1200).
