Activity 1 – Guthrie Theatre Workshops – PCLS/PLS Multi-region program

Activity Type: Education

Description of program – Full detail to include presenter(s) – Guthrie Theatre Classes.

Teaching Artists Carin Bratlie, Sigrid Sutter, Michael Jurenek and Aaron Preusse conduct 29 programs at various public libraries and schools in the Plum Creek and Pioneerland Regions. Libraries had their choice of three programs:

1) **Once Upon a Time Kid Storytelling.** Children who participated in this program discovered how to tell stories in new and exciting ways. Teaching Artists encouraged children to use their imaginations and creativity to create collaborative stories of all kinds. This program was designed for ages 7-10

2) **Acting Games for Beginners.** Participants of this program learned what methods and tricks of the trade actors and ensembles use to rev up creative juices, tune up their spontaneity and stay in the moment. This program was designed for ages 7-10; 11-13; and 14-17

3) **Duke it Out: Intro to Stage Combat.** Participants learned how to fight, fall and use swords without hurting anyone – just like the actors do it on stage. It looks real, but it's just pretend. This program was designed for ages 11-13; 14-17; and families with children over the age of 11.

Proposed Measurable Outcomes: End User

Measurable Outcomes may be collected by survey, anecdotal responses, pre-test/post-test, observations; Describe proposed end user change in Behavior, Attitude, Skills, Knowledge, Condition and/or Status.

PCLS and PLS proposed to determine if participants had increased their interest in acting and various other aspects of theatre production; the likelihood of them attending a theatre production in the future; the likelihood of them participating in a theatre production in the future; and whether they would attend another theatre class in the future.

PCLS and PLS also wanted to determine how often attendees frequented their library.

Measurable Outcomes: State end user change in Behavior, Attitude, Skills, Knowledge, Condition and/or Status based on their response to program..

Following are the results of our survey:

In response to the survey question: “**Did this program increase your interest in acting?**”, 82% said *yes*; 9% said *no*.

In response to the survey question: “**Did the program increase your interest in other aspects of the theatre?**” 72% said *yes*; 10% said *no*

In response to the survey question: “ **Did the program increase the likely hood that you would attend a theatre production in the future?**”, 57% said *most likely*; 31% said *somewhat likely*; 6% said *not likely*.

In response to the survey question: “ **Did the program increase the likely hood that you would participate a theatre production in the future?**”, 47% said *most likely*; 32% said *somewhat likely*; 6% said *not likely*.

In response to the survey question: “**Would you attend a class in like this in the future?**”, 86% said *yes*; 7% said *no*

68% of the respondents rated the quality of the Teaching Arts as Excellent

59% of the respondents rated the quality of the class they attended as Excellent

38% of the respondents visited their library *often* (at least once a week) whereas 40% visited their library *sometimes* (at least once a month).

Proposed Measurable Outcomes: End User

PCLS and PLS proposed to provide participants to a live theatre experience they otherwise may not have access to. The theatre experience would include behind the scene tours and oral histories of the theatres.

PCLS and PLS proposed to build community support for the theatre and encourage people to participate in local productions who may have not considered that before.

Travel to the theatres was provided by several different charter bus companies for maximum efficiency and to keep costs at a minimum.

Measurable Outcomes: State end user change in Behavior, Attitude, Skills, Knowledge, Condition and/or Status based on their response to program..

Following are the results of our survey:

In response to the survey question: “**How Much did this program increase your interest and knowledge of community theatre?**”, 68% said *Significantly*; 31% said *Slightly*; 2% said *Not at all*.

In response to the survey question: “**Have you attended a theatre production before today?**” 86% said yes; 14% said no

In response to the survey question: “**Did the program increase the likely hood that you would attend a theatre production in the future?**”, 80% said *very likely*; 19% said *somewhat likely*; 1% said *not likely*.

In response to the survey question: “**Did the program increase the likely hood that you would participate a theatre production in the future?**”, 20% said *most likely*; 24% said *somewhat likely*; 56% said *not likely*.

75% of the respondents rated the quality of the actors as Excellent

75% of the respondents rated the quality of the production they attended as Excellent

45% of the respondents visited their library *often* (at least once a week) whereas 37% visited their library *sometimes* (at least once a month); 14% *rarely* visited the library; and 3% *never* visit the library.

Activity 7 – Title: Two Guys from Scott County

Activity Type: Library Legacy Sponsorship Grant

Description of program – Full detail to include presenter(s) -

Gordon W. Fredrickson, a former farm boy, English teacher, and farmer, uses a large screen as he performs an introduction, a Prologue, a story, and explains why he writes about farming. He wears the traditional apparel of a farmer in 1950 as he recites one of his books and tells other stories.

Since the year 2000 Gordon has performed stories in museums, elementary schools, libraries, senior/community centers, church basements, club meetings, and Antique Tractor and Threshing Shows in Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, and Michigan. He has also performed for a country school in the southern mountain region for a classroom in France.

His delightful children's picture books tell stories of bygone days on the farm, preserving an important piece of rural history while educating today's children. His goal is to write books that help bring the local farm heritage to life. Stories are based on actual events and offers all ages the opportunity to read and enjoy stories that bring back memories for some and to inform others of the times in which their parents, or grandparents, or great grandparents were children

Proposed Measurable Outcomes: End User

- Knowledge/history of farming, and farm life.
- We may learn the difference in the size of equipment, modern conveniences and the changes that have come over the years.
- We hope to have new interest in the past, and the history of our ancestors.

Measurable Outcomes: State end user change in Behavior, Attitude, Skills, Knowledge, Condition and/or Status based on their response to program..

- One younger mother quoted "I like to hear things about past history. I thought the author was very good at giving a description of life in the olden days. Great idea to preserve our farming history through his stories and illustrations. I especially liked to see how the landscape was years ago and the changes to how our farms look nowadays."
- Because history books are written and printed in the large cities, the books completely lack the knowledge of the farming culture in the past. Gordon's goal is to pass on this heritage, and he an excellent job of doing this in an entertaining manner.

- One "older" woman could relate to that way of life and how things were accomplished in that era. She shared some of her stories during the questions and discussion time.
- Relating with the author, not only brought back memories, but made us realize what we know or take for granted should be documented or that part of history may be lost. It was mentioned that writing our thoughts down is a great heritage for children and grandchildren.

Chad Lewis presented a program with a slideshow about different locations in Minnesota that are haunted or reported to have paranormal activity. He gave the history of each location and the local lore of the haunting. Activity 14 – Title: Mural Art by Greg Preslicka

Activity Type: Library Legacy Sponsorship Grant

Description of program – Full detail to include presenter(s) -

Artist Greg Preslicka, of The Big Picture, (www.thebigpicturemurals.net), will paint six murals on the walls of the children's room in the Slayton Public Library. To begin with, the entry door to the room will be highlighted with inviting artwork; a large area above the children's easy books will be filled with images correlating to the library's American Girls doll collection and highlighting the various historical eras that they represent. Preslicka will draw together some of Slayton's historical features in this area, as they correspond to the American Girl dolls, and the town's past, present and future. On the opposing wall he will create a work that will represent the future, incorporating a window in his drawing, for gazing outward. Further into the room he will continue his theme on two other areas above the children's non-fiction stacks.

The artist will also provide instruction to local high school art students in his mural making process, including how a concept is formed into a design, how it is translated into mural size, and how the actual painting is performed.

The library will solicit input from the public as to the final design selections and when they are complete, a public open house will be held for the unveiling of the finished project.

Proposed Measurable Outcomes: End User

Measurable Outcomes may be collected by survey, anecdotal responses, pre-test/post-test, observations; Describe proposed end user change in Behavior, Attitude, Skills, Knowledge, Condition and/or Status.

- Art students will gain invaluable knowledge from an experienced, knowledgeable professional artist on the creation of mural art.
- Library patrons will gain an appreciation for the historical content of Preslicka's paintings, which will incorporate the area's history and hopes for the future.
- The artwork will provide an inviting setting for young patrons, and hopefully encourage them to linger longer in the library, surrounded by the beauty and interest that the murals will bring. They will draw patrons into the children's section and into the other areas of the library

Measurable Outcomes: State end user change in Behavior, Attitude, Skills, Knowledge, Condition and/or Status based on their response to program..

The mural provided the end user with glimpse into Slayton's past through art designs of the original prairie, Indian teepees, native wildlife, etc, as well as visual renditions of the present as in the painting of the courthouse.

Those patrons who had the opportunity to watch the artist paint the mural, learned many painting and sketching techniques, gained knowledge in the various types of paints that can be used to paint a mural, and were fascinated at meeting a 'famous' artist.

The first scene with the Indians (Native Americans) Greg put in a kind of swampy, marshland feel for the picture because of the massacre that took place at Slaughter Slough, northeast of Currie a few miles, near Slayton. It was another big historical moment. There is also a big marsh south of town called "The Big Slough" that was purchased and developed by the Dept. of Natural Resources through the guidance and determination of Hiram C. Southwick, 100 years ago. That wildlife area has been officially renamed "The Hiram C. Southwick Wildlife Management Area" but everyone still refers to it as the 'Big Slough'. Just a tidbit of local history.

The mural incorporates Buffalo Ridge which is a prominent geographical area in this part of the state and the Native Americans who were here before anyone else. Then the mural moves on to the settlement of the region with the wagon trains, the scene in the mural is reminiscent of the Laura Ingalls Wilder books which also play a prominent part of the settlement of this area. The mural moves on to historic downtown Slayton with horse drawn vehicles. The pictures for the buildings were actually taken from old photographs that we asked the Murray County Historical Museum. Two prominent buildings are the old courthouse that was destroyed in the early 1970's to make way for a more modern, efficient courthouse and the old bank building which is now the "Left Bank" coffeehouse and restaurant and other smaller buildings now gone.

Library patrons clearly wanted books and reading, families and children depicted in the mural - hence the scenes of a parent reading to a little girl looking through a window to the past on one side of the room and on the opposite side another adult reading to a small boy looking through a window to present day where the mural shows a modern agricultural backdrop with a farm scene moving into the wind towers that are so very conspicuous today. The mural then moves beyond the wind towers to an astrological scene giving the impression that the stars are the limit, you can go anywhere.

The archway into the children's area was our first thought to have something fun for the kids to see as they entered their space. The artist finished the archway with a fun array of stars and books, maybe portraying the idea that books can take you anywhere.

Murray County Central School gave the 4th grade classes an opportunity during school hours to watch and see the progression of the mural from the beginning of sketching the design on the wall through the actual painting of the mural.

Murray County Historical Museum provided pictures from which the artist gained inspiration.

The exact number of participants was not obtained however the community as a whole was invited to stop by the library to watch the mural in progress.

A classroom of 4th graders spent an hour each day to watch as the mural was sketched on the wall through the actual painting process.

When asked the question “How much did this art project increase your knowledge of drawing and painting?” 59% of the children responding *Significantly*

When asked the question “Did this project increase your understanding of why art is important to the history and culture of your community?” 82% responded *Significantly*

95% of those filling out the survey noted that the overall artistic quality of the mural as *excellent* and 85% considered the artist’s expertise and skill as *excellent*.
