Activity 1 – Storyteller Series Programs

Activity Type: Education & Outreach

Description of program

Traverse des Sioux Library System was proud to present *Storytellers*, a series of programs held last spring that brought three notable individuals (Hall of famer and Minnesota Twins legend, Harmon Killebrew; award winning national Geographic photographer and Minnesota native, Annie Griffiths Belt, Jeannette Walls, columnist and author of the memoir The Glass Castle and the "true life novel" Half Broke Horses) to the region. All events took place from 7:00- 10:00 (due to autograph signing) and were free and open to the public.

South Central College, North Mankato – For the Annie Griffiths event there was no cost for the conference center rental, and SCC provided all video/media equipment, technical help and custodial help. SCC also provided volunteers and dinner for presenter and student photographers at the Annie Belt event. A small fee was paid to rent the conference center for the Marc Brown event, but technical and custodial help were provided as well as volunteers for the event.

Martin Luther College, New Ulm - Space was rented for a small fee, but MLC provided video/media equipment, technical help and custodial help.

Armstrong Middle School, St. James - The space was rented for a small fee, but BLC provided video/media equipment, technical help and custodial help.

Media in the nine county area – Promotion of events.

Harmon Killebrew – 450+ attendees, 131 evaluations returned 29% of attendees turned in an evaluation card.

94% of evaluations returned reported that attendees learned something new about Minnesota sports history.

93% of evaluations returned reported that attendees have a greater understanding of Harmon Killebrew's role in shaping Minnesota sports history.

96% of evaluations returned reported that attendees enjoyed the program

Annie Griffiths - 115 attendees, 71 evaluations returned 62% of attendees turned in an evaluation card

92% of evaluations returned reported that attendees learned something new about environmental treasures in the United States.

100% of evaluations returned reported that attendees had a greater understanding of and appreciation for Annie Griffith's work after attending the program.

100% of evaluations returned reported that attendees enjoyed the program.

Jeannette Walls – 292+ attendees, 208 evaluations returned 71% of attendees turned in an evaluation card.

97% of evaluations returned reported that attendees learned something new about the creative process of writing memoirs and/or novels

98% of evaluations returned reported that attendees had a greater understanding of and appreciation of Jeannette Wall's work after attending the program.

99% of evaluations returned reported that attendees enjoyed the program.

- * Can't tell you how glad I came with my husband & our youngest son.
- * Great program to give insight to young people about the history of the game.
- * This was an excellent way to begin the storytellers series. A home run.

Many other outcomes are on file.

Griffiths event –

From the evaluation cards returned, listed below are a few outcomes/observations/anecdotal responses from audience participants. The attendees consisted adults and students and most of them were amateur photographers or people interested in photography.

- * I saw beauty in things that I never thought would be interesting.
- * I thought a person needs to go to exciting places for great pics this showed me opportunity is in my own backyard.

From the evaluation cards returned, listed below are a few outcomes/observations/anecdotal responses from audience participants. The attendees consisted mostly of female adults, students, book club members and those that enjoy reading.

- * I learned the importance of truth & perspective.
- * I now understand that we all should take a good look at the events in our lives good or bad and realize how it influenced our life in the long run.
- * I learned something about memoirs & writing. I didn't know much before.
- * I learned about texture of ourselves and that we each have a story to tell.
- * But I loved her story and felt I knew what she meant.
- * I love hearing about an author's work from her own mouth.
- * I like that she feels she is a storyteller but looks for the lessons & and is gratified by it.

However I already had a great appreciation of her work.

- * I loved her positive outlook & her belief in turning hardships into gifts.
- * I realized how difficult it was for her to tell her story picking & choosing which parts to tell & how to paint a truthful picture.
- * We loved both of Jeannette's books, hearing is a wonderful treat!
- * I was one who believed the best thing for her brother and sister would have been to be rescued. I understand more now that it wasn't.

Activity 2 – Battle of the Books

Activity Type: Education & Outreach

Description of program:

Eighteen teams of 4 young adults competed in the 2010 Battle of the Books competition. The teens were asked to read four books and there were three rounds of questions for each book. We also were able to have two of the authors of the books produce a small video of introduction of themselves and their book and ask two questions! Over 75 family supporters came to watch and listen and encourage the participants. The room was filled, rice krispie bars and juice and water were devoured and a great time was had by all!

The teens were asked to read four books - *The Graveyard Book* by Neil Gaiman, *The Hunger Games* by Suzanne Collins, *The Off Season* by Catherine Gilbert Murdock, and *Speak* by Laurie Halse Anderson.

Teams were given one point for each correct answer to questions about each book. Nine teams were eliminated after the first round and six more after the second round. Scores were very close as these teens were vying for first place and a chance to win portable DVD players. The top three teams competed in the final round with the most difficult questions. After scores were tallied in the final round, the top team was determined to be the winners of the competition and the winners of the DVD players. The second team was only behind by one point!

All participants left with a \$10.00 gift card to Barnes & Noble to encourage continued summer reading! Each participant was asked to fill out an evaluation form.

Authors - Catherine Murdock, and Laurie Halse Anderson – Each produced a short video of themselves introducing themselves, welcoming the teens to the event, short introduction of their books and asking the first two questions.

Barnes & Noble, Mankato – We purchased the gift cards from Barnes & Noble and they helped publicize the event in the Mankato store.

Sam's Club, Mankato – Donated a \$25.00 gift card for refreshments

Margaret Alexander Edward's Trust – Donated \$2,000 for the purchase of books for each participant

Carl & Verna Schmidt Foundation – Donated \$1,650 to cover costs of incentive and other expenses

Media in the nine county region – Promotion of events

Program Outputs: Outputs are things you can count such as attendance, number of new participants, and the number of attendees who had never been at a similar event, and so on.

Teams participated from each of the TdS 9 counties.

18 teams of four young adults = 72 participants in 2010 versus 15 teams and 60 participants in 2009. All 72 participants returned the evaluation card.

From the evaluations returned, 94% of the participants enjoyed the event.

68 of 72 reported having fun at the event.

56 of 72 reported they would do the event again next year, 13 said maybe and 3 said no.

70 participants offered book suggestions for 2011.

All 72 participants received a Barnes & Noble \$10.00 gift card.

75 spectators watched the event

More library staff volunteered to help the day of the event -10 in 2010 vs. 5 in 2009.

Assuming all participants read all four titles, participants had to use their reading comprehensive skills while reading the books to prepare for the competition.

Librarians reported teens checked out the read-a-like books from the list provided for provide for each of the selected books.

Measurable Outcomes: May be collected by survey, anecdotal responses, post-test; End user change in Behavior, Attitude, Skills, Knowledge, Condition and/or Status

Five programs each from two artists for a total of 10 programs

- 1,200 attended the Doug Wood's programs
- 1,050 attended the Mike Wohnoutka programs

Students learned how to retell a story in correct sequence and demonstrated this by creating a series of illustrations to match their own story's theme.

Students learned various illustration styles and how they enhanced text to go with the illustrations.

Students created a multimedia production using skills of the authors/illustrators/song-writer. This end product included text and illustrations that students were able to share with not only their families and friends, but also with author/song-writer Douglas Wood.

That the regional public library system and its branches/members are in compliance with *Minnesota Statutes* 2004, Chapter 134.50 (a) so that all public library computers with access to the Internet available for use by children under the age of 17 must be equipped to restrict, including by use of available software filtering technology or other effective methods, all access by children to material that is reasonably believed to be obscene or child pornography or material harmful to minors under federal or state law, and section (c) so that the library prohibits, including through the use of available software filtering technology or other effective methods, adult access to material that under federal or state law is reasonably believed to be obscene or child pornography.
- 6.
